

This renovation transformed a conventional Chicago two-flat into a custom single-family residence with a modern, open floor plan. The creative new layout offers open yet defined living spaces and brings abundant natural light deep into the home. The natural wood tones of the beamed ceiling bring warmth to a streamlined modern kitchen, while generous windows maximize daylight and provide a strong visual connection to the outdoor living spaces.





The existing layout was composed of a series of separate spaces with limited connections between rooms. The transformed home features continuous light-filled living areas and framed views. Circulation flows easily from the entry, through the stair hall and service spaces to the outdoors.

A sculptural stair, invites the eye to travel vertically, and encourages views across the full breadth of the home. At the rear of the house, a glass exterior wall visually extends the open interior out to the terrace and garden beyond.









The living spaces are aligned in a sequence of rooms to create a wide circulation path framing uninterrupted views from the front to the rear of the home. The before image shows the original narrow passage joining dark and compartmentalized rooms.







The custom openriser stair floats in front of a glass wall creating a dramatic focal point opposite the dining room. Wood-banded treads were fabricated to match the prefinished french oak flooring. Blackened, slender steel balusters simply connect treads together for increased rigidity and transparency of the stair railing.







The bridge deck is made of individual wood planks that repeat the detailing of the stair treads. Raising the ceiling and window wall above the balance of the second floor ceiling creates a distinct volume at the stair hall and bridge.








The original basement had a low ceiling height. Excavating and underpinning the existing foundation walls transformed the space into a living area commensurate with a brand new home. A connection between the house and garage was created below the rear yard terrace and allows for a convenient interior passage in Chicago's inclement weather.



The contrast between stained wood and painted black cabinets offers both drama and warmth, while defining the adjacent family room and kitchen spaces. On the right, translucent sliding wall panels extend the view through the primary bedroom to the wall of windows beyond and allow privacy as desired.






The new design maintains the existing brick side walls and floor structure, while updating the front facade with dramatic window openings, white brick and white mortar to create a distinct contemporary facade.



A raised terrace and garden replace the narrow windowless crevasse between the house and garage. The new masonry façade and structural steel frame allow for oversized glass doors to visually connect the family room to the outdoor living spaces. A perennial filled planter, installed atop a lowered portion of the adjacent garage, unites the terrace and garage roof deck.

ENGLISH MANOR

The heart of this modest post war country home is preserved yet transformed to fit a modern lifestyle. With incompatible past additions removed, the thoughtful renovation extends and enhances the character of the original building. Wood siding and limestone recall the original cladding materials, while new rooflines, dormers, and chimneys compliment the existing building proportions. New double hung windows reference the floor-to-ceiling windows found in the living room.

Doric pilasters and columns, and traditional balustrades add dramatic flair to the covered terrace and office, as well as to the breakfast room and side entry.







A harmonious addition replaces an existing two story flat-roofed sunroom. The house is enhanced with the addition of a side entry porch, breakfast room, home office, covered terrace, wet bar gallery, and family room. A second floor addition gracefully expands the primary suite. Generous galleries at the first floor living spaces and primary bedroom suite facilitate circulation and a connection between the rooms.





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The home office opens to the covered terrace and the generous lawn beyond. A new chimney at the terrace anchors the transformed rear façade.

The family room addition gracefully extends the house across the site. A new circular drive recenters arrival at the limestone paved entry porch which is enhanced with columns and trim that reflect the new detailing at the additions.

A modest service space with a constrained side entry was replaced with a sunlit breakfast room opening to the expanded kitchen. Pilasters flank the breakfast room doors and transition to columns at an inviting side entry porch. A colonnaded terrace with a large outdoor fireplace provides a protected space for entertaining in any weather.







Formal perennial garden parterres flank the terrace, while casual outdoor seating is nestled under a majestic honey locust tree. New double hung windows reference the floor-to-ceiling windows found in the living room.



A formerly congested primary bedroom suite is transformed into a generous spa bath with the existing fireplace remaining in place. A mirrored gallery with built-in cabinetry joins the bath and closets to the bedroom and terrace.











Focus on the Fairway







FOCUS ON THE FAIRWAY

This colonial home renovation reimagines the original character of the house by adding a light-filled entry gallery overlooking the covered front porch. The revised circulation plan opens up the interior to frame views and improve flow between spaces while maintaining the traditionally defined rooms throughout. New large-paned casement windows replace modest double-hangings to enhance the scale of the exterior facade and streamline the architectural detailing. The arrival sequence is improved by relocating a brick-lined driveway southward to extend the lawn and allow boxwood clouds set in ground cover to frame new bluestone walks. Overlooking the idyllic golf course beyond, the new rear garden and bluestone terrace better define the yard and provide a generous outdoor living space.

The addition of a light-filled entry gallery and breakfast room provides generous circulation routes unifying the plan. Large-paned windows flood the spaces with natural light and orient the home toward sweeping golf course views.










The breakfast room addition fills the missing link in a suite of rooms facing the golf course and provides direct access between the sun room, kitchen and family room. Previously, long, narrow corridors constricted access from the kitchen to the dining room and sunroom.










The reconfigured kitchen features symmetric cabinetry elevations, a barrel vaulted ceiling and a window wall at the sink. The butler's pantry offers an axial view from the entry gallery through the dining room and breakfast room to the golf course beyond.


On the left, a sliding stone panel conceals a spice cabinet and television.



Golf course views, a large fireplace and custom cabinetry balance traditional elegance with casual comfort within the intimate family room crafted from existing service spaces.








A whimsical renovation of the existing rear stair offers an enticing focal point in the gallery and a new landing at the bottom dramatically improves access to the second floor.









The addition of a gabled roof and fireplace in the family room and a second gable over the two-story breakfast room addition, bring balance to the rear elevation. Cohesive largepane windows replace several discordant window styles to further unify the façade. The allée of trees define the rear yard and organize the exterior living environment. **BBA ARCHITECTS**
